Sunday School Lesson July 31, 2022, Grace Baptist Kearneysville, West Virginia

"Basic Bible Stories – Cain and Able" Genesis 4:1-16

Open: Story

- After the fall of man, God kicked man out of the garden of Eden. Gen 3:23-24
 - Man would no longer be living in the perfect place that God created for him. "Our sin will always take from us what God wanted for us."
 - Man would live the rest of his life with a sinful nature. "Sin will always complicate God's plan for life."
 - Man would now struggle with the conflict of choosing to do what God wanted or what man wanted.
- Cain and Able, were born to Adam and Eve. <u>vs. 1-2</u>
 - Cain was the older and was a tiller of the ground (Farmer.)
 - Able the youngest of the two brothers was a keeper of the sheep (Shepherd.)
- Cain decides one day he is going to try to please God by doing his own thing. <u>vs. 3-4</u>
 - God required a blood sacrifice.
 - Able was obedient and brought an acceptable sacrifice. (a blood sacrifice)
 - Cain was disobedient and brought what he thought should be accepted. (the works of his hand)
- Cain becomes angry with God, jealous with his brother, an begins to harbor bitterness in his heart toward God and his brother. <u>vs. 5-6</u>
 - Cain gets angry at God for rejecting his sacrifice.
 - Cain gets jealous of his brother's sacrifice being accepted.
 - Cain could not see that it was not the actions of others causing his turmoil it was his own disobedience.
- Instead of taking advantage of the second chance he had been given, Cain decides to take matters into his own hands and kill his brother Able. <u>vs. 7-8</u>
 - God gives Cain a chance to rectify his wrongdoing, but Cain did not seek forgiveness he sought revenge.
- Cain, upon the murder of his brother Able, continues to disobey and begins to make excuses as well as lie to God about his actions. <u>vs. 9-10</u>
 - Cain no doubt would have still been punished, but if he were honest with God and sought forgiveness the punishment may not have been as sever. *(i.e. ...Moses, David, Saul.)*
- God tells Cain what his punishment would be, and Cain leaves the presence of God. <u>vs. 11-16</u>
 - Cains punishment
 - Work will not yield fulfilment.
 - Rejected by man because of his attitude and interactions.
 - o Cains response
 - Accepts his punishment but does not seek restoration with God. <u>vs. 14</u>
 - Cain made a choice to never return to God's favor. <u>vs. 15</u>

"Cain's downfall was not murder; it was his choice to reject God and disobey...murder was the end result of his disobedience to God." <u>Rom. 6:23</u> "For the wages of sin is death..."

I. 3 things to recognize in your own life.

- A. Man's sin nature.
 - i. You must recognize the reality of your sin nature. <u>Rom. 7:19, 21-23</u> "For the good that I would I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do. [21] I find then a law, that, when I would do good, evil is present with me. [22] For I delight in the law of God after the inward man: [23] But I see another law in my members, warring against the law of my mind, and bringing me into captivity to the law of sin which is in my members."
 - ii. You must realize that whoever you yield to you will be servant to. <u>Rom. 6:12-14, 16</u> "Let not sin therefore reign in your mortal body, that ye should obey it in the lusts thereof. [13] Neither yield ye your members as instruments of unrighteousness unto sin: but yield yourselves unto God, as those that are alive from the dead, and your members as instruments of righteousness unto God. [14] For sin shall not have dominion over you: for ye are not under the law, but under grace. [15] What then? shall we sin, because we are not under the law, but under grace? God forbid. [16] Know ye not, that to whom ye yield yourselves servants to obey, his servants ye are to whom ye obey; whether of sin unto death, or of obedience unto righteousness?
- B. Man's natural selfishness. Man has a built-in desire to please God, but because of the other law in his members has a fleshly desire to do what his flesh wants to do.
 - i. <u>Rom. 7:24-25</u> "O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death. [25] I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord. So then with the mind I myself serve the law of God; but with the flesh the law of sin."
 - ii. <u>Gal. 5:17</u> "For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh: and these are contrary the one to the other: so that ye cannot do the things that ye would.
- C. Man's normal response to sin.
 - i. Blame others Adam & Eve
 - ii. Hide from God Adam & Eve, Cain
- iii. Take out the anger I have towards myself, for the decisions I made, on those around me. Cain

II. 3 observations from Cain and Ables Life.

- A. Able did not have an easier path to doing right.
 - i. Able still had to choose the bring the right sacrifice.
 - ii. Able still had to follow the guidelines for the sacrifice.
 - iii. In your eyes it may seem that someone else has an easier life and is successful because doing right just comes more naturally. <u>Ps. 73:3, 17</u> "For I was envious at the foolish, when I saw the prosperity of the wicked. [17] Until I went into the sanctuary of God; then understood I their end."

B. Everyone has the same opportunity to do right.

- i. Cain an Able had the same...
 - 1. Parents
 - 2. Environment
 - 3. Opportunities
 - 4. Knowledge
- ii. You and I have the same...
 - 1. Sin Nature
 - 2. Holy Spirit
 - 3. Word of God
 - 4. Free will.
- C. Able chose to obey, while Cain chose to disobey.
 - Joshua 24:15 "And if it seem evil unto you to serve the LORD, choose you this day whom ye will serve; whether the gods which your fathers served that were on the other side of the flood, or the gods of the Amorites, in whose land ye dwell: but as for me and my house, we will serve the LORD."
 - i. Obedience is the deciding factor in the outcome of individuals lives.
 - ii. The more I obey the more blessed by God I can be.

"Children, obey your parents in all things: for this is well pleasing unto the Lord.."
